Тема урока: «10 Downing Street». Учебник "Spotlight - 9", модуль Culture Corner 2.

Тип урока: Введение и активизация нового лексического материала.

Цель урока: совершенствование коммуникативной компетенции по теме «Резиденция премьер-министра Великобритании».

Задачи урока:

1) Образовательные:

- формирование и совершенствование иноязычной коммуникативной компетенции;
- развитие умений поискового и изучающего чтения; расширение словарного запаса;
- развитие умений монологической речи;
- развитие умений продуктивного письма.

2) Развивающие:

- развитие способности вступать в иноязычное общение; развитие способности логического изложения мыслей; развитие навыка языковой догадки; развитие психических функций обучающихся (память, мышление, внимание), эмоциональной сферы, прогнозирования, рефлексии.

3) Воспитательные:

- формирование познавательной активности; формирование потребности к сотрудничеству и взаимопомощи при работе в паре.

Формы работы: фронтальная, индивидуальная, парная.

Оборудование и наглядность: учебник «Spotlight - 9», аудиокурс к УМК «Spotlight - 9», компьютер, мультимедийный проектор, экран, мультимедийная презентация.

Ход урока

1. Introduction.

Teacher: Good afternoon, everyone! How are you? I hope that you all are fine today.

Have you travelled this year? Would you like to go to England someday? What places would you like to see there? Look at the screen to choose three of these most famous sights you would go to.



2. Checking the homework.

3. Identifying the topic of the lesson.

Teacher: Look at this picture and try to guess what this place is. You can find one prompt if you look at the front door of the building in the picture.



Teacher: Yes, this building is famous for its number – “Number 10” or 10 Downing Street.

So, today we are going to get to know this place better.

4. Reading.

Go to page 37. Let's look through the text and be ready to answer three questions:

1) Where is it?

2) Who lives there?

3) What takes place there?

10 Downing Street

10 Downing Street or 'Number 10' as the British call it, is one of the most famous addresses in the world. It is also a very busy place where hundreds of people work and where many **official functions**. Cabinet meetings and state dinners take place. Many people will immediately recognise the front of the building.

Number 10 was **originally** given to the first prime minister, Sir Robert Walpole, as a gift. Before he moved in, though, he joined 10 Downing Street to the large house behind it and had some alterations made. So even though Number 10 looks like an **ordinary** serviced house from the outside, there are many beautiful rooms with elegant decor and fine furniture including the State Dining Room, the Study, the Terrace Room and the White Drawing Room. There are portraits of every past prime minister hanging on the walls of the Grand Staircase. The table in this room is boat-shaped so that the Prime Minister can always see everyone sitting around it.

The Prime Minister's private home is a furnished flat on the second floor, once described by Margaret Thatcher (British Prime Minister from 1979-1990) as 'living above the shop'. The Prime Minister also has his own study. There, he often meets colleagues, receives important guests, makes phone calls or gives interviews.
